The Greater Glory Campaign Richard Driehaus '60 meets the campaign head on

All For The Greater Glory

For any private school, a strong, active constituent base is one of the most important means to providing a thriving, exciting and challenging educational atmosphere for future generations of students. St. Ignatius College Prep is no exception. After a thorough strategic planning process that took place over a two-year period from 2000-2002, the school identified priorities in the areas of school department support, as well as plans to complete the physical plant which has been ongoing for the past two decades. These strategic choices, made with input from faculty, staff, administrators, trustees, alumni, parents and benefactors of St. Ignatius, have been translated into a series of campaign goals in support of our mission.

In October 2003, St. Ignatius College Prep publicly embarked on the beginning phases of *The Greater Glory Campaign*, a five-year, \$30 million quest to provide improvements throughout all areas of the school. The resources would be spread through four specific endowments:

Programmatic Endowment (\$18 million goal): This fund was created to give us the ability to maintain appropriate staffing levels, support additional co-curricular athletic programs, upgrade technology, enhance fine arts and offer more competitive salaries, benefits and pension programs for all of our employees, without putting the entire burden for additional salary increases on the cost of tuition alone.

Academic Department Support (part of Programmatic Endowment): To attract and retain excellent, faith-filled teachers who are committed to our mission is critical to our "Ignatian difference." The goal in this area is \$11 million.

Athletic Programs (part of Programmatic Endowment): To help support the increased number of programs and participation that has occurred over the past decade in

our athletic programs. The goal in this area is \$2.5 million.

Technology (part of Programmatic Endowment): To maintain and expand the excellent level of service provided over the past decade in our technology program. The goal in this area is \$2.5 million.

Fine Arts (part of Programmatic Endowment): To further enhance our outstanding fine arts program in areas such as art, photography, music, theater and dance. The goal in this area is \$2 million.

Maintenance Endowment (\$5 million goal): To help us care for the tremendous investment which has been made in our facilities over the past 20 years, and without leaving under-funded liabilities for future generations, we will create a maintenance endowment. Currently, only about half of our annual depreciation is actually funded.

Construction Fund (\$4 million goal): To finish the ground floor of the main building, to expand the theater stage and to build the park at May Street, we will raise funds during the campaign. In addition to these construction projects, the fund will assist with proposed land acquisition projects.

Tuition Assistance Endowment (\$3 million goal): We will increase the tuition assistance endowment to help meet our ever-rising demands for need-based grants to families who otherwise would not be able to afford a St. Ignatius education.

Richard Driehaus '60 Challenges the St. Ignatius Community To Give

In December 2004, **Richard H. Driehaus '60** issued a challenge to the St. Ignatius College Prep community. Driehaus, an Honorary Co-Chair for the campaign with Dan '65 and Patty Walsh and Jim '51 and Jacque McDonough, made a \$1.5 million dollar pledge to be given over the five years of *The Greater Glory Campaign*.

Richard's gift will be matched three-to-one with the \$4.5 million new dollars that are raised toward the \$5 million maintenance endowment goal. Therefore, if the challenge is successful, the school will exceed the goal in this area by

\$1 million. Driehaus's gift not only allows him to give back to the school that gave him so much, but also provides him with opportunity to be the catalyst for other donors to follow in kind and preserve the rich history and traditions of our 135-year-old Jesuit, Catholic institution. After hearing about the challenge, St. Ignatius alumnus and trustee **Joseph Starshak '63** contacted the school and expressed his interest in responding to the Driehaus Challenge as part of his own support for *The Greater Glory Campaign*. For Driehaus, sharing what he has earned has been a lesson he learned at

a very early age. Growing up in a family of modest means on Chicago's Southside, Driehaus took to heart a quote he remembers to this day from the nuns at St. Margaret of Scotland Parish: "You're responsible for your own actions." This statement would not only drive him professionally, but be the base for all of his philanthropic efforts throughout Chicago via the Richard H. Driehaus Foundation.

"Richard came from an impoverished family on the south side," said Roger Guerin, President and General Counsel of Driehaus Enterprise Management, Inc. "He wants to pay back his local community what he has earned and what they have given to him throughout his life. He wants to give away more than \$100 million dollars in his lifetime and he is well on his way to doing that."

Driehaus began working on a paper route at a very early age and saved up all of the extra money he received in the form of tips. At the age of 13, he used the tip money to purchase his first shares of stock. It was then that his love

for the stock market and investments bloomed. It is said that Driehaus was often seen reading the *Wall Street Journal* during lunch while attending St. Ignatius. After graduating from high school, Driehaus enrolled at DePaul University, earning both a bachelor of science and master of business administration degrees from DePaul's College of Commerce. In 2002, he was awarded with an honorary doctorate degree from the university.

Professionally, Driehaus is recognized the world over as one of the pre-eminent portfolio managers in the investment management industry. His innovative research ideas helped him skyrocket up the ladder of firms such as A.G. Becker, Mullaney, Wells & Co. and Jesup and Lamont. In 1979, he founded his own firm, Driehaus Securities Corporation, followed by Driehaus Capital Management, Inc. in 1982, Driehaus Mutual Funds in 1996 and Driehaus Capital Management, L.L.C. in 1997.

"Richard is a very warm and charming man," said **Matt Walsh '64**, Chairman of Walsh Construction Company and a Co-Chair of *The Greater Glory*

Campaign Executive Committee with his wife, Joyce. "He has enormous intellectual curiosity and though he enjoys good architecture, fine wines and expensive art, he is in no way defined by his wealth. Instead, he chooses to spread his good fortune to the people and places who have had a great effect upon his life."

Driehaus's philanthropy has extended to all levels of education, as well as embracing the arts and those who produce art. Among his numerous gifts, Driehaus has graciously given to St. Margaret of Scotland Parish, DePaul University (the Richard H. Driehaus Center for International Business) and St. Xavier University. He has sponsored annual engineering and architectural design competitions at Illinois Institute of Technology (IIT), the University of Notre Dame and University of Illinois at Chicago and established the Herman Driehaus scholarship at IIT in memory of his father, who was an engineer. Driehaus has also given money to restore homes and buildings in Chicago's Bronzeville neighborhood, as well as Old St. Patrick's Church. He contributed to the restoration of a 1905 Georgian Revival style home in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin and

to several preservation societies in the United States Virgin Islands. His philanthropy also can be seen in various Chicago Public Schools buildings, Chicago's Millennium Park and Barney Circle in Washington D.C.

"For years, Richard Driehaus has shaped the city of Chicago through his generous and well-thought-out philanthropy," said Dr. Judith Dwyer, president of St. Xavier University. "His recent gifts to St. Xavier University and now St. Ignatius follow in that tradition—deeply impacting the schools, the students and the city of Chicago. He is a terrific friend of us all."

In 1991, Driehaus crafted the first "Driehaus Challenge" for St. Ignatius after a disastrous fire started in the chemistry lab of the 1895 building. His challenge rallied the support of Ignatius alumni and brought \$1.25 million dollars towards the cost of the restoration. In June 1995, after construction on the wing of the building was complete, and 100 years after it was originally built, the 1895 building was dedicated as The Richard H. Driehaus Building. Many of the artifacts that adorn the hallways, classrooms and meeting areas at St. Ignatius are native to Chicago

history and were donated by Driehaus as part of the "Driehaus Collection".

"Richard has a 20,000 square foot warehouse filled with splendid things," said **Fr. Donald Rowe, S.J.**, former president of St. Ignatius College Prep, who was instrumental in working with Driehaus in carefully selecting the pieces of the collection. "[Richard] has a vast collection of antiques and he invited me to come and choose which items would best fit in the school. It was very nice of him to do that for us and he has been a leader among our donors."

One might ask why Driehaus would pledge another gift in excess of \$1 million dollars to his alma mater after having done so once before. To Roger Guerin, the answer was quite simple.

"Richard has seen what St. Ignatius College Prep has done with his prior contributions and he's pleased with the way they have been used towards the growth of the school, as well as maintaining the prominence of the institution within Chicago's Catholic education system," Guerin said.

A recent article in *The Wall Street Journal* reports that a survey by PNC Advisors in Pittsburgh has determined that at least twenty percent of individuals with investable assets in excess of \$500,000 do not have a will. 
PARENTS' ORGANIZATION
